This week's Traditional Tale is Hansel and Gretel.

Date and WALT:	To get you thinking:	Activity:
<p>Monday 29th June</p> <p>WALT: Write an alternative ending.</p>	<p>Have you heard of the story of Hansel and Gretel? It is an old German fairy tale which was first published in 1812. Hansel is a little boy and Gretel is his sister. Do you know what happens to them? If you don't know the story, read through the PowerPoint.</p>	<p>Go back to the point in the story where Hansel and Gretel find the gingerbread house in the woods. Plan and write a different ending to the story from this point. Who lives in the house? Are they nice or nasty? What happens to the children? Do they end up going back home? You could even change the gingerbread house into another type of house! Write in paragraphs and remember to use punctuation. Try and write as much as the original story ending. <i>You will need: Hansel and Gretel PowerPoint.</i></p>
<p>Tuesday 30th June</p> <p>WALT: Write a detailed description.</p>	<p>Think about the forest where Hansel and Gretel get lost. What might a map of the forest look like? Where would their house be? What about the gingerbread house? What else might be in the forest? Any more strange houses? Any unusual trees?</p>	<p>Draw a map showing the forest from the story, including plenty of details. What might Hansel and Gretel walk past? What else might be in the forest that they don't see? Look at the example of a map of a park. Your forest map won't look the same as this, but you need to include a key similar to this one on your map. Then, write a detailed description explaining Hansel and Gretel's journey through the forest. <i>You will need: Park map example.</i></p>
<p>Wednesday 1st July</p> <p>WALT: Write instructions.</p>	 <p>Read through the recipe for gingerbread people.</p> <p>Can you find the imperative verbs (bossy words telling you what to do, such as 'cut' or 'mix')? Read through the ingredients list. Can you spot where in the recipe you have to use each ingredient?</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Use the gingerbread recipe and some crayons to complete the instructions features list.</li> <li>2. Then make up your own recipe for a different type of house in the woods – perhaps a cottage made from vegetables? A mansion made from chocolate? A hut made from cheese? Write your own ingredients list and recipe for making your new house, setting it out using the features list. <i>You will need: Gingerbread people instructions and instructions features list.</i></li> </ol>

Thursday 2nd July

WALT: Write a newspaper article.

Pretend you are either Hansel or Gretel. Imagine you have been asked to write a newspaper article to describe what happened to you in the forest. You will need to tell people all about the gingerbread house, the old woman, what happened to you and how you got safely home again.

Use the 'Planning a newspaper report' sheet to plan what you want to include in your article. Perhaps you could interview your brother/sister who had the adventure with you?

Use this plan to write your article on the newspaper page template. Think about how you will set it out and include all the information from your plan. The top box is for the name of the newspaper, the next box is for the title of the article and the square box is for a picture.

*You will need: Planning a newspaper report sheet and newspaper page template.*

Friday 3rd July

WALT: Design a leaflet.

*Fact:* In 2013, the world's largest gingerbread house was built in the USA and won a Guinness World Record. It measured 18 metres long, 13 metres wide and 3 metres high!

Choose your favourite world records and design a leaflet called 'Did you Know?' to present them.

Think about the layout – will you use bubble writing, different shaped boxes or pictures to display your facts?

Fold a piece of paper to make your leaflet – see below for examples of how you could do this. When you have finished you can stick your leaflet into your book.
